WHAT ARE CULTURAL IP RIGHTS?

Cultural Intellectual Property Rights® (CIPR) are a proposal for a new generation of rights that protect Traditional Cultural Expressions (TCEs) such as textiles and associated Traditional Knowledge (TK) such as knowledge of local nature by Indigenous Peoples, ethnic groups and local communities from exploitation.







WHAT ARE HUMAN RIGHTS?

<u>Human rights</u> are universal and implied for every individual, from birth until death, simply for being human. They are a tool to create a world of equity, dignity, social justice and wellbeing.





What Are Human Rights?

According to the United Nations, an example of violating human rights is:

"Banning the use of minority or Indigenous languages (the right to participate in cultural life and the right, in community with the other members of their group, to enjoy their own culture, to profess and practice their own religion, or to use their own language)."



TRANSFER OF TRADITIONAL KNOWLEDGE

By using traditional motifs in a design without consent or collaborating with artisans, I am helping to preserve a culture.




